



Dear Parents and Children,

Many thanks for your amazing response to our ROAR (Read, Observe, Respond and Rescue) sponsored tiger-themed reading event. The final total including the money raised on World Book Day came to an overwhelming **£1483.91**. This is a huge achievement for a small, single-form entry primary school and one of the largest totals raised by Cathedral School in recent years.

A spokesperson from the charity 21<sup>st</sup> Century Tiger said, "This is a fantastic amount, the children have been amazing".

We decided to support 21<sup>st</sup> Century Tiger because:

- 🐅 They support carefully vetted tiger projects focusing on anti-poaching, education, habitat restoration and monitoring
- 🐅 It is a wild tiger conservation partnership between the Zoological Society of London and Global Tiger Patrol
- 🐅 **100%** of our donation goes directly to support wild tiger conservation projects as the charity's administration is funded independently.

Did you know?

- 🐅 There are only 4,000 wild tigers left in the whole world.
- 🐅 Of the eight subspecies of tigers originally defined three are now extinct.

### **New Books**

As well as being an opportunity to help the plight of an endangered species, the ROAR event has been a fantastic way to introduce the children to new books and authors; in addition it has highlighted the importance of reading for pleasure. We are very grateful to the parents who spent a considerable amount of time organising the event, contacting publishers, taking photos, contacting the press and designing the sponsor forms and logos. Consequently we now have over 50 new titles to add to the school library, courtesy of various publishers who donated books for prizes and for the school library. A special mention must go to Walker Books who generously donated a copy of *Can we save the Tiger?* By Martin Jenkins and Vicky White to

each child in the school and to Joanna Skipwith who gave each child in the Junior School a copy of her book *Tigers in Art*.



We would like to continue to value the experience of reading for pleasure in school and with that mind there is a **Cathedral Readers** area of the website now dedicated to book reviews and we will be encouraging pupils to contribute to it.

### **Visitors**

During the ROAR project we have welcomed the following visitors and would like to thank them for their interesting and inspiring sessions:

Ruth Padel (Darwin's great great grand-daughter), led a tiger poetry and story writing workshop in Year 3 and 4 based on her experiences journeying through many different countries in order to research her book '*Tigers in Red Weather*'.

Esther from the charity 21<sup>st</sup> Century Tiger talked to Year 1 and 2 their work with wild tigers.

Rosie from London Zoo brought in tiger artefacts and spoke to the whole of Key Stage 2 about the reason why tigers are hunted and how London Zoo supports tiger conservation – see the Year 6 blog on the website for more details.

Andrew Nunn, Dean of Southwark Cathedral led a spiritual workshop for Years 5 and 6 based on Blake's poem 'The Tyger'.

### **Entrepreneurship**

Another positive outcome of the project was the opportunity children were given to develop their entrepreneurial skills; one group of children even raised money during a birthday party! A parent spoke to me about the fact that their child had put together and practiced a 'sales pitch' for potential sponsors. Every envelope containing sponsorship money contributed to the conservation of the tiger – many thanks.

- 🐅 £85 will buy basic field equipment for one ranger for a year in Thailand (wet weather gear and backpack)
- 🐅 £40 will pay a community ranger in Sumatra for one month.
- 🐅 £67 will pay for a field radio for FFI in Kerinci Seblat National Park in Sumatra.
- 🐅 £36 will buy a mobile phone with camera for a ranger in Sumatra
