Letters

"Sometimes you got two or three letters in about a month, and then other times you didn't get a letter for well over a month. The post was very irregular. They had to be censored, didn't they."

Whenever you sent a letter it had to be read through and any information that could be use to the Germans was crossed out in black pen (as you can see in the picture) because the letter could be intercepted and then sent on to you friends or family.

over


- * He Joined the army in 1939.
